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

As another year comes to a close, it's a great time to reflect on our accomplishments and plan for greater things to come. As Vice President of SF HAAC, I think about all the great things we accomplished over the past two years, such as hosting community improvement projects, networking events, and numerous career development workshops entitled, *Limitless—Your Potential for Personal Growth and Development*.

Many participants of the *Limitless* workshops shared positive feedback, saying they felt *reenergized*, *refocused* and *ready to take charge of their own careers*. Many attendees asked, *How did this workshop come to life*? or, *How did you come up with the idea for this workshop*? I would like to share with you, the story, behind the

Limitless workshop and how the concept originated.

In the summer of 2013, SF HAAC was invited to attend the 84<sup>th</sup> Annual League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) National Convention & Exposition in Nevada by Bill Zielinski, former San Francisco Regional Commissioner. LULAC is the oldest and most widely respected Hispanic Civil Rights Organization in the United States. It was created at a time in our country's history when Hispanics were denied basic civil and human rights, despite contributions to American society. The founders of LULAC created an organization that advances the economic condition, educational attainment and civil rights of the Hispanic population of the United States.

Representing SF HAAC at the LULAC convention was, Jason Welsh, former Inland AVP and I, Albert Meraz, Vice-President. Over 5,000 participants from all over the nation attended this convention, including top leaders from government, business, and the Latino community. During the convention, we attended several town hall meetings, workshops, and forums that covered issues and topics concerning the Hispanic community and workforce. Some of the topics covered included Diversity in the Federal Government, Managing Change, Conflict Resolution, Managing Up, Building LGBT Latino Power, Mentoring and Succession Planning, and Empowering Nuestra Comunidad through Civic Engagement.

We heard powerful and uplifting messages from keynote speakers such as Honorable Joe Biden, Vice president of the United States, Jose Fernandez, Retired NASA Astronaut and Bill Zielinski, former SF Regional Commissioner. The following are a few excerpts of their speeches:

No matter where you are in life, it's a matter of whether you prepare yourself and are ready to take on the opportunities. I think the key to everything is that you have to prepare yourself. You have to study and get a good education. You have to have a good work ethic and you have to have the support of your family. You put all those things together, and you can achieve any dream.

When invited to *Limitless Your Potential Growth & Development*, I immediately jumped at the opportunity to attend. Paired with my mentor for the day, Erika Leonard, I was provided with her first-hand experience with HAAC and her journey in her professional development. Being in the presence of someone



highly assertive and knowledgeable was a lesson within itself. I appreciated her guidance and shared experience in her field throughout the day. Through the panel of directors who shared their experiences, I learned the importance of self-motivation, effective communication, being action-oriented, and having a good work-life balance.

Fernando Peralta equipped me with imperative information in "Managing Up." For many students and particularly women, we are often times socialized to be complacent with landing ourselves a "good job" but not taught to assume leadership roles within our respective organizations. Perlata emphasized the importance of being a leader in every position. He said you must lead initiatives in each position you fulfill. A main take-way for me from this segment was how trust and expertise result in credibility, which I found to be a very powerful and useful lesson in the walks of leadership. The highlight of my *Limitless* experience was Al Ballon's lecture: "Making Yourself Indispensable." Ballon discussed the two alternatives we are working towards: Being indispensable or being obsolete. Ballon laid down the tips for making oneself indispensable, including: Interpersonal skills, importance of attitude, getting feedback from our peers and higher-ups, and personal capability. After hearing Ballon's insightful workshop, I could not help but think, "How did I not know this? Why are we not learning this in the college classroom?" I am very thankful to have had an opportunity outside of my traditional classes to partake in such a great learning experience. College students have an enormous pressure to be successful but are never really told how to achieve that success.


We held the first meeting of SF HAAC Tri-Counties and LA Metro areas in the City of

Corn Bread Stuffing

Ingredients

Corn Bread Mix -2 packages, Celery -1 bunch, Onions -2 (white or yellow), Kielbasa sausage - your preference

Sage (rubbed sage or ground, they are two different versions of it), Chicken broth -2 cans

### Directions:

Makes 2 cake pans of cornbread. Make cornbread according of box instructions.

Crumble into roasting pan

- 1. Chop celery, sage, onions, sauté in lots of butter.
- 2. Pour over cornbread mix.
- 3. Sprinkle sage over cornbread mix.
- 4. Pour 1 ½ to 2 cans of chicken broth and mix.
- 5. Put into oven to make crispy and cook all the way through.
- 6. Cook at 350 degrees for 15 minutes.

Jalapeño Popper Dip

### Ingredients

1 cup of mayo, 2 (8 oz.) cream cheese packages, 5 Jalapeños (chopped), 2 small cans of diced green chiles, Panko bread crumbs

Grated Parmesan cheese

### Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Mix the mayo, cream cheese, jalapeños, & green chiles in a bowl; spread into a round baking dish.
- 3. Pour a layer of breadcrumbs over the mixture and then another layer of parmesan cheese.

Bake in preheated oven until bubbly and crispy, 30 to 45 minutes

½ tube of Chorizo- your Choice of meat

Queso Chihuahua al gusto

5 strips of Tocino/Bacon

1 can of Tuna

2 Chiles Picados en rajas (los de lata en vinagre)

Salsa Valentina a su gusto



### Directions:

- 1. Fry the chorizo add the cooked bacon (picadito)
- 2. Once the chorizo and tocino are fried, then add the beans (they must be fully fried)
- 3. Se bate muy bien para que no se pegue en la cazuela.

Chili Bean

### Ingredients:

Buy 4 packets of Lawry's Chili spices and seasoning mix, 1 pound of ground beef (best for taste),8 oz. pinto beans, 8 oz. Red kidney beans, 8 oz. White kidney beans, 8 oz. black beans, (different colors make chili very eye pleasing), 16 oz. tomato sauce, 1 fresh tomato, ½ fresh onion, 3 garlic cloves

### Directions:

- 1. Open all bean cans and place in colander You may rinse beans if you wish Let sit
- 2. In a blender, combine tomato sauce, fresh tomato, onion and garlic by using chop feature
- 3. Pour contents in a deep pot, use the 16 oz. tomato sauce can to add 16 oz.'s of water to contents in pot (I like a lot of juice in my chili)

Bring to boil on medium heat, pour 1 packet of chili sauce to mixture

(Taste, if you want a stronger chili taste add more packets to your desired taste). Simmer on low heat, in separate skillet Brown ground beef, drain. Add beef to pot Fold in beans to pot so that a good mixture is obtained and the beans are not mashed Taste the mixture as you might have used more than one chili packet by now. Let simmer on low heat for 30 minutes and you are done.

This recipe is good on all kinds of foods Bon Appetite, mi amigos and remember, Si Se Puede !!!
